From the CEO and Chair

Heritage Calgary is driven by our vision of a city that understands and values its diverse heritage. As the cultural and economic vibrancy of our city moves to the forefront of our attention, heritage has a significant role to play. From Calgary's booming film industry to the growing efforts towards environmental sustainability, heritage conservation is an important piece of revenue generation and city-building. At Heritage Calgary we continue to find, promote, and create opportunities to connect Calgarians to our shared heritage.

INVENTORY + DESIGNATIONS

In January 2022, Heritage Calgary and The City of Calgary successfully launched a major update to the online Inventory of Evaluated Historic Resources. The Inventory is a digital repository of research and images of Calgary's 900+ historic resources. The online Inventory is an important tool that brings the history of our city to life, and with this upgrade we ensure historians, researchers, and the curious public can continue to access important information about Calgary's historic resources.

In 2022, Heritage Calgary updated 56 re-evaluated sites and added 20 new sites to the Inventory, with 7 sites receiving legal Municipal Historic Resource (MHR) designation.

NRCR HANDBOOK

In May of 2022 we delivered the Naming, Renaming, Commemoration, and Removal (NRCR) Handbook to City Council. The handbook provides a resource and discussion guide for anyone thinking of undertaking an NRCR project in their community. More information on the NRCR Handbook can be found in this report and on our website.

Over 500 Calgarians participated in the Naming, Renaming, and Commemoration Project that led to the development of the Handbook. Heritage Calgary expresses a sincere thank you to all those who offered their time and thoughtful insights, guidance, and experiences to the project. We extend special gratitude to the members of the Indigenous Sharing Circle and to The City of Calgary Council Innovation Fund for funding this important work.

PROGRAMS & COMMUNITY PARTNERSHIPS

We added 6 new tours to our roster of self-guided walking tours in 2022, making a total of 12 tours available on our website. Thank you to Mayor Jyoti Gondek for joining us in October for a walking tour of Haunted Inglewood!

Heritage Calgary continues to partner with community organizations to raise awareness of our shared heritage. We continue to collaborate with heritage advocacy groups and to work with community associations to participate in local area planning processes.

Shelly McElroy was the 2022 Historian in Residence in partnership with the Calgary Public Library. She was the curator of Pioneer Acres Museum in Irricana, Alberta. Pioneer Acres Museum is one of the largest agricultural and industrial history museums in Alberta with a collection of thousands of artifacts. Shelly has a background in education, agriculture, counselling, and museums.

We also congratulate our new Chair, Christine Leppard. Christine has served as a board member of Heritage Calgary since 2017 and at the end of 2022 was elected as Board Chair. Congratulations Christine!

OPERATIONAL UPDATES

To assist in managing future growth, Heritage Calgary received a grant from the Calgary Foundation in 2022 to implement a Client Relationship Management system - often referred to as a CRM. The system is called CiviCRM and is open source. Heritage Calgary has been able to customize the system to handle donations through the website, and handle intake requests for individuals who want to nominate sites to be listed on the Inventory of Evaluated Historic Resources.

Thank you to Janet McCready for her years of service and contributions to Heritage Calgary. Janet has served on the board for five years; she first joined the Board of Directors in 2017, served as Vice Chair from 2019-2021, and as Chair from 2021-2022. 
The Inventory of Evaluated Historic Resources ("the Inventory") is the cornerstone of our mission to embrace and keep space for the stories of this place. The Inventory is a database that lists historic resources in Calgary. It is maintained by Heritage Calgary on behalf of The City of Calgary. Evaluations are based on a rigorous framework and a set of predetermined criteria approved by City Council.

There are currently just over 900 (906) historic resources listed on the Inventory, and last year the 155th Municipal Historic Resource was designated.. Designations are generally applied to historic buildings, but also include many of Calgary's parks and boulevards.

Interest in Calgary's diverse heritage continues to grow, as demonstrated by Inventory and designation growth and increasing engagement with heritage programs and communications.

IN 2022, HERITAGE CALGARY:

- approved the re-evaluation of 56 historic resources;
- added 20 new historic resources to the Inventory; and
- 7 properties achieved Municipal Historic Resource (MHR) designation.

DESIGNATION PROCESS

In Alberta, municipal heritage designation is regulated by the provincial Alberta Historical Resources Act. It requires City Council to pass a designation Bylaw to formally adopt a historic home as a Municipal Historic Resource (MHR).

To qualify for MHR designation, a property must already be on the Inventory of Historic Resources. The designation process is a collaborative discussion between the property owner and the department of Heritage Planning at The City of Calgary.

In January of 2022, Heritage Calgary successfully completed a major upgrade of the online Inventory of Evaluated Historic Resources, a digital repository of research and images of Calgary's 900+ historic resources. This was a collaborative year-long project between Heritage Calgary and The City of Calgary.

HERITAGE POLICY INITIATIVES

In 2022 Heritage Calgary continued to collaborate with The City on several major heritage policy projects. Heritage Calgary participated in the development of the North Hill Communities Heritage Guidelines and is currently consulting with The City on the Riley Communities Heritage Guideline Areas.

We also engaged with the Downtown Strategy team to better identify and preserve heritage resources during the re-imagining of the downtown core, particularly in the repurposing and retrofitting of vacant buildings.

Heritage Calgary also actively reviews and comments on Development Permits (DPs) and Land-Use Change Applications (LOCs) that will impact Inventory resources. We strive to achieve a balance of preservation of historic elements of buildings while making way for adaptive reuse of the building. We continue to work with The City on the development, piloting, and implementation of forthcoming Heritage Conservation Tools.



PARTNER INITIATIVES

Heritage Calgary continues to work with community associations to participate in local area planning processes and collaborate with heritage advocacy groups.

In 2021-2022 this included a partnership with the Hillhurst Sunnyside Community Association to complete a historical context paper for the area. In 2022, a partnership with the Marda Loop BIA facilitated a historical context paper to be shared in 2023.

Throughout the year, we worked with our community partners at the Calgary Heritage Initiative (CHI), Chinook Country Historical Society, The Calgary Public Library, The City of Calgary, The Calgary Foundation Jane's Walks, The Glenbow, Southern Alberta Pioneers, The City of Calgary Archives, The National Trust, and The University of Calgary.

WALKING TOURS

This year we added six new tours to our series of self-guided walking tours, making a total of 12 available on our website.

In the fall of 2022 we launched a new self-guided walking tour of Haunted Inglewood, just in time for Halloween, and we visited a few of these spooky locations with Mayor Jyoti Gondek.

PLAQUE PROGRAM

The Heritage Calgary plaque program is available to historic sites listed on the Inventory. Four plagues were added in 2022: Cope House (demolished 2019), Hone Ranch House, Neelands Residence, and Shaarey Tzedec Synagogue (demolished in 2014).

In early 2022, in collaboration with the Black Law Students' Association at the University of Calgary and the homeowner, we presented a plaque commemorating the King Residence. The King family, including siblings Violet King and Theodore King, are recognized for their work to advance racial equality in Alberta and are a significant part of Alberta's civil rights history.

On August 11, 2022 Heritage Calgary presented a plaque commemorating the Shaarey Tzedec Synagogue to FirstService Residential and the Jewish Historical Society of Southern Alberta. The plaque was created to commemorate the location of the former synagogue. It will replace a previous bronze plaque which went missing and was presumably stolen

HERITAGE MATTERS

In 2022, Heritage Calgary collaborated with community partners to host several events. With the Calgary Public Library and the communities of Chinatown, Hillhurst-Sunnyside, and Marda Loop, we hosted an event to learn about context papers at Memorial Park Library.

We partnered again with the Calgary Public Library, as well as the Calgary Heritage Initiative and Chinook Country Historical Society, on a roundtable discussion on the Stephen Avenue Historic District and the proposed redevelopment for the block. Speakers Cynthia Klaassen, Harry Sanders, and Aritha van Herk discussed the public value of our frontier main street and why it was declared a National Historic District.

For Historic Calgary Week, hosted by Chinook Country Historical Society, we presented two events: the "Brutal Walking Tour" and "Naming, Renaming, Commemoration, and Removal in Calgary". We made two presentations at the National Trust Conference on our online Inventory map and the NRCR project, and our CEO made presentations to the Canadian Club of Calgary and as a guest lecturer at the University of Calgary.



HISTORIAN IN RESIDENCE

The Historian in Residence is a six-month paid residency that supports individual researchers working in any genre related to the diverse social, cultural, and built history of Calgary, Treaty 7, and Metis Region 3. The residency is presented in partnership with the Calgary Public Library.

MESSAGE FROM THE HISTORIAN

In 2022, I had the honour of being the Historian in Residence for Heritage Calgary and the Calgary Public Library. Although this happened only one short year ago, it is amazing to realize how much the times have changed. In March of 2022, we were unsure of what programming would look like as our weary world was taking tentative steps to emerge from the Covid-19 pandemic.

And as it happened, my programming was a blend of in person and virtual. There was a Jane's Walk, a couple of podcast style interviews, articles for the Heritage Calgary blog, a children's program for Canada Day at the library, a display of artifacts, a presentation during Historic Calgary Week, a cemetery tour, connections with another resident (the wonderful 2022 Storyteller in Residence Mary Hays).

My favourite part of my residency was the individual appointments, virtual and in person, that I had with Calgarians who were creating manuscripts, maps, walking tours, books, or programs of their own. I was able to point

sible resources that could make their own historic projects and research come to life. Small rural museums are isolated at the best of times. They can be understaffed and even when we aren't in the grip of a global pandemic, resources can be in short supply. By choosing to invest in me, an entire community benefited. I completed research for new exhibits thanks to the resources at Calgary's Story. Through the blogs I created for Heritage Calgary, I met new colleagues, such as the archivist at the United Farmer's Historical Society. I also heard from voices in the agricultural community about how much they enjoyed and appreciated having their history highlighted in such a significant way.

Thank you so much for the opportunity to be the 2022 Historian in Residence. It was an experience that I will never forget. I can't wait to see how this program evolves in 2023 and beyond!

In 2022, we launched a major upgrade of the online Inventory of Evaluated Historic Resources, a digital repository of research and images of Calgary's over 900 historic resources. We published 23 blog posts, (including regular Inventory updates), exploring subjects such as Black history in Calgary, the Stephen Avenue Historic District, women who have served on City Council, a history of early Calgary newspapers, catalogue homes, and Calgary's agricultural history. The number of page views and visits to our website continue to increase year over year, with 41K website visits and 61K page views in 2022.


In 2022, our following grew across all platforms. Our most popular posts included the new Inventory launch, our self-guided walking tours, the history of early Calgary newspapers, the site of the week series, as well as a blog and social series covering the block of Stephen Avenue and 7th Avenue affected by a proposed redevelopment.

We partnered with Mayor Jyoti Gondek to deliver a Haunted Inglewood Walking Tour just in time for Halloween. We also shared the initiatives of partner organizations such as The City of Calgary, Calgary Public Library, Chinook Country Historical Society, Calgary Atlas Project, the Calgary Horticultural Society, the National Trust, the UCalgary Black Law Students' Association, Lougheed House, and the Alberta Museums Association.

Our newsletter remains a popular source of information for our community, with over 1300 subscribers and an average 58% open rate, well above industry averages. Our monthly newsletter collects the most interesting and important updates in one convenient location.

THE MEDIA

Heritage Calgary's work in the community has been supported by our valued relationships with traditional news media. This year we did 28 media stories and interviews delving into our Naming, Renaming, Commemoration and Removal (NRCR) report, the proposed redevelopment on Stephen Avenue, the growing awareness and appreciation for heritage buildings in Calgary and how they are essential for environmental sustainability.



Financials, Funders, and Donors

With this year's funding as a Civic Partner of The City of Calgary, we were able to continue investing in significant Inventory work, including updating/adding 76 sites to the Inventory. We delivered programs for the public and increased our online communications to promote awareness of Calgary's heritage.

We received project funding from the City of Calgary of \$115,846, which was used to complete the Naming, Renaming, Commemoration, and Removal Handbook as well as additional evaluations to support the work being done on Mainstreets and downtown revitalization.

We are also grateful for the Calgary Foundation for their grant of \$20,000 to support the implementation of our new database and to the Young Canada Works Program, through the National Trust of Canada, for helping to fund our summer student.
