From the CEO and Chair

2021 continued to be a year of challenges for us all, but we still saw the good shine through. As issues of cultural and economic vitality and environmental sustainability move to the forefront of our attention, heritage has a significant role to play. Heritage conservation is a critical piece of sustainable city building, and at Heritage Calgary we continue to find, promote, and create opportunities to connect Calgarians to our shared heritage.

INVENTORY AND DESIGNATIONS

This year Heritage Calgary successfully completed a major upgrade of the online Inventory of Evaluated Historic Resources, a digital repository of research and images of Calgary's nearly 900 historic resources. Though we promote Calgary's heritage, this doesn't need to extend to old database software! This was a collaborative year-long project between Heritage Calgary and The City of Calgary.

The online Inventory is an important tool that brings the history of our city to life. This successful upgrade will ensure historians, researchers, and the curious public can continue to access important information about Calgary's historic resources.

In 2021, Heritage Calgary added 12 new sites and 36 re-evaluated sites to the Inventory, with 14 sites receiving legal Municipal Historic Resource (MHR) designation. We continue to support The City in their goal of having the Inventory cleaned-up and ready in advance of the potential residential tax credit that is anticipated to be in place starting 2023.

THE NRC PROJECT

Throughout the year, we continued work on the development of a framework for naming, renaming, and commemoration across Calgary. In collaboration with a team of heritage professionals, Heritage Calgary engaged with stakeholders and community members and is on track to deliver a comprehensive framework to City Council in the spring of 2022.

PROGRAMS AND PARTNERSHIPS

In collaboration with The City of Calgary and Levis Fine Art Auctions & Appraisals, Heritage Calgary conducted an auction of historic pieces of city architecture from the Centre Street Bridge and the Queens Hotel. The auction raised \$65,000 which was used to create an endowment with the Calgary Foundation to fund the plaque program. Beginning in 2021, any privately owned properties that have been formally designated as Municipal Historic Resources (MHRs) can obtain a plaque for their property at no personal cost, should they wish to celebrate and share the history of their property.

This year we added two new tours to our roster of self-guided walking tours, making a total of six available on our website: Cliff Bungalow-Mission, Chinatown, Inglewood, Warehouse District, Kensington, and Bridgeland-Riverside.

We celebrated the 2021 Heritage Calgary Awards, recognizing winners in the categories of Resource Conservation, Advocacy & Volunteerism, Cultural Landscapes, Heritage Storytelling, and Heritage Trades & Craftspeople. Congratulations to the winners and thank you to our community jury members! You can learn more about each winner in this report and on our website.

Heritage Calgary continued to partner with community organizations through 2021 to educate, advocate for heritage preservation, and to raise curiosity and awareness of our city's heritage. Heritage Calgary continues to work with community associations to participate in local area planning processes and collaborate with heritage advocacy groups.

HISTORIAN IN RESIDENCE

C.W. (Cory) Gross was our 2021 Historian in Residence in partnership with the Calgary Public Library. Cory is a professional educator with over 20 years of experience in museums and heritage. His primary field is the geology of Western Canada and its intersection with Indigenous, settler, and immigrant histories.

During his residency, Cory curated a final exhibit for the Central Library titled Calgary's

prehiStory. The exhibit outlined major periods of Calgary's ancient past and how they have shaped our culture, economy, and even architecture today. The exhibit incorporated a life-size diorama of Alberta's 375-million-year-old coral reefs.



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Inventory & Designations

BRINGING HERITAGE TO CALGARIANS WITH A COMPREHENSIVE DATABASE OF CALGARY'S HISTORIC RESOURCES.

The Inventory of Evaluated Historic Resources ("the Inventory") is the cornerstone of our mission to embrace and keep space for the stories of this place. The Inventory is a database that lists historic resources in Calgary. It is maintained by Heritage Calgary on behalf of The City of Calgary. Evaluations are based on a rigorous framework and a set of predetermined criteria approved by City Council. Independent researchers conduct the evaluations and provide expert research and analysis of historic properties.

There are currently nearly 900 (884) historic resources listed on the Inventory, and last year we designated our 119th Municipal Historic Resource. Interest in Calgary's diverse heritage continues to grow, as demonstrated by Inventory and designation growth and increasing engagement with heritage programs and communications.

IN 2021, HERITAGE CALGARY:

- approved the re-evaluation of 36 historic resources.
- added 12 new historic resources to the Inventory.
- 14 properties achieved Municipal Historic Resource (MHR) designation.





DESIGNATION PROCESS

In Alberta, municipal heritage designation is regulated by the provincial Alberta Historical Resources Act and requires City Council to pass a designation Bylaw to formally adopt a historic home as a Municipal Historic Resource (MHR).

To qualify for MHR designation, a property must already be on the Inventory of Historic Resources. The designation process is a collaborative discussion between the property owner and the department of Heritage Planning at The City of Calgary.



INVENTORY OF EVALUATED HISTORIC RESOURCES UPGRADE

This year Heritage Calgary successfully completed a major upgrade of the online Inventory of Evaluated Historic Resources, a digital repository of research and images of Calgary's almost 900 historic resources. This was a collaborative year-long project between Heritage Calgary and various City of Calgary departments and teams, as well as the participation of many beta testers from the heritage community.

The online Inventory is an important tool that brings the history of our city to life. This successful upgrade will ensure historians, researchers, and the curious public can continue to access important information about Calgary's historic resources.

HERITAGE POLICY INITIATIVES

In 2021 Heritage Calgary continued to collaborate with The City on several major heritage policy projects. Heritage Calgary participated in the development of the Guide for Local Area Planning (formerly the Guidebook for Great Communities) and the affiliated North Hill Communities Local Area Plan. We continue to be a stakeholder in the development of Heritage Guideline Area policies. We also engaged with the Downtown Strategy team to better identify and preserve heritage resources during the re-imagining of the downtown core, particularly in the repurposing and retrofitting of vacant buildings.

Heritage Calgary also actively reviews and comments on Development Permits (DPs) that will impact Inventory resources. We strive to achieve a balance of preservation of historic elements of buildings while making way for adaptive reuse of the building. We continue to work with The City on the development, piloting, and implementation of forthcoming Heritage Conservation Tools.

NAMING, RENAMING, AND COMMEMORATION PROJECT

At the end of 2020 Heritage Calgary submitted a proposal to The City's Civic Innovation Fund to pursue the development of a framework for naming, renaming, and commemoration across Calgary. In 2021, Heritage Calgary conducted an RFP process and selected a highly qualified team of heritage professionals to execute the NRC project plan. In collaboration with Hatlie Group, CIPR, and Dougherty Consulting, Heritage Calgary engaged stakeholders and community members and is on track to deliver a comprehensive framework to City Council in the spring of 2022.

ENGAGING PEOPLE THROUGH THE STORIES OF CALGARY'S DIVERSE HERITAGE.

PARTNER INITIATIVES

Heritage Calgary continues to work with community associations to participate in local area planning processes and collaborate with heritage advocacy groups. In 2021 this included a partnership with the Hillhurst Sunnyside Community Association on a historical context paper for the area. We also partnered with the YWCA for an event on the Women on Calgary City Council, with Pioneer Acres for an online lecture on Royal Visits to Calgary, and with Chinook Country Historical Society on several events for Historic Calgary Week.

PLAQUE PROGRAM

The Heritage Calgary plaque program is available to historic sites listed on the Inventory. Four plaques were added in 2021: Cope Residence, Deane House, Madden Residence, and the King Residence.

In 2021, we held an auction of historic artifacts from the Centre Street Bridge and the Queens Hotel. The auction raised \$65,000 which was used to create an endowment with the Calgary Foundation to fund the plaque program. Privately owned properties that are formally designated as Municipal Historic Resources can now obtain a plaque at no personal cost. In June, we presented a plaque for

the <u>Madden Residence</u> to Gene & Irene Huber. Their 1911 Rosedale home is the first to receive a plaque from the fund.

In 2021, the University of Calgary Black Law Student's Association (BLSA) expressed interest in funding a plaque for the King Residence. In collaboration with the BLSA and the current homeowner, we presented a plaque commemorating the King family including siblings Violet King and Theodore King, who are recognized for their work to advance racial equality in Alberta and are a significant part of Alberta's civil rights history.

HISTORIAN IN RESIDENCE

The Historian in Residence is a six-month paid residency that supports individual researchers working in any genre related to the diverse social, cultural, and built history of Calgary, Treaty 7, and Metis Region 3. The residency is presented in partnership with the Calgary Public Library.

MESSAGE FROM THE HISTORIAN

"In 2021, I was privileged to serve as the Historian in Residence (or as I nicknamed it, the "Prehistorian in Residence") for Heritage Calgary and the Calgary Public Library. My driving question was how Calgary's ancient past shaped Indigenous, settler, and immigrant histories and connections to the landscape.

The ongoing pandemic limited the amount of office time I was able to spend in the Central Library. However, that was more than made up for by virtual public engagement through online talks, individual consultations,


and blog posts for Heritage Calgary. One of my avenues of research was physically tracking down former sandstone quarry sites throughout the city, blogging about them, and creating an accessible Google Map of some of their locations.

My final project was the exhibit <u>Calgary's prehiStory</u> on the fourth floor of the Central Library. This exhibit pulled rock and fossil specimens from several private collections, as well as the collections of the Alberta Palaeontological Society, to share Calgary's ancient past and our cultural connections

to it. The exhibit ran from September 2021 to March 2022, and I earnestly hope that it will be resurrected in some form in Calgary before too long.

Thank you very much for allowing me to serve as Historian in Residence for 2021 and for providing such a vital program linking Calgarians with the cultural and natural histories of this amazing place that we all share."

THE BLOG

Heritage Calgary is committed to promoting awareness of our city's heritage. In 2021, we published 68 blog posts and guest posts, and the number of page views and visits to our website more than doubled. We explored subjects such as the women of Calgary City Council, LGBTQ2+ history, the women of Chinatown, the story of Jack White Goose Flying, and Calgary's prehistory. We also published features on the Heritage Calgary Award winners to highlight their incredible achievements and contributions.

We partnered with the Inglewood BIA for a takeover of their Instagram account, leading two online tours via their Instagram Stories. We shared the initiatives of local organizations such as the Calgary Atlas Project, Calgary Horticultural Society, and Historic Calgary Week.




THE NEWSLETTER

Financials

2021 MARKED THE THIRD YEAR HERITAGE CALGARY WAS FUNDED AS A CIVIC PARTNER OF THE CITY OF CALGARY.

With this year's funding as a Civic Partner of The City of Calgary, we were able to continue investing in significant Inventory work, including updating/adding 48 sites to the Inventory. We delivered several programs for the public and doubled our online communications to promote awareness of Calgary's heritage during the ongoing pandemic.

We received project funding of \$222,869, which was used to fund the Naming,

Renaming and Commemoration project as well as to support The City in their goal of having the Inventory cleaned-up and ready in advance of the potential residential tax credit that will hopefully be in place starting 2023.
